BIRD TIP

Windsor is known as a good place to find a Northern Shrike in winter. These robin-sized birds are always seen alone and usually perch at the very top of the tallest tree overlooking an



expanse. They are striking birds: white bodies with dark wings and a black line through their eye. Shrikes prey on insects, rodents, and small birds, capturing them with their thick hooked bills (unlike raptors, they have no talons with which to capture their meals). They kill by holding prey in their bills and then shaking their heads vigorously to kill it. They "store" the prey by impaling it onto a nearby twig barbed wire. Thus, they are known as the "Butcher Bird". —Holly Higinbotham

From the Green Committee

The town is receiving the first disbursement of the Green Committee's latest state competitive grant funds, allowing us to invite bids from insulation contractors for the Town Hall basement ceiling and the Town Garage walls. Meanwhile, we got town approval for and acquired a sump pump for the Town Hall basement, which our volunteers installed. This, along with the insulation, will alleviate most of the basement moisture and warped floor issues in the main hall.

We continue to pursue aggregation for Windsor electric costs. The DPU process is incredibly slow but we understand the new board is redoing Municipal Aggregation Guidelines and seems more positive. Acceptance will allow us to enter a cooperative contract for lower electric bills.

We are pleased that the Town of Windsor is a recipient of a 2023 Leading by Example Award from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. It honors towns that show outstanding public sector energy and environmental efforts in the Municipal category. —Marnie Meyers

Energy Saving Tip

Now's the time to start planning your 2024 vegetable garden--Online seed catalogs are brimming with choices. Homegrown food is not only healthier but it reduces your environmental impact, as commercially grown food requires fuel and transport, as well as the use of plastic containers and wrap. Whether you have room for a tub on the deck, a few raised beds, or a big tract of earth, home food gardening offers lots of great options.

Winter is here! If we ever get snow, please remember that on April 7, 1975, the Town voted to prohibit and remove vehicles parked on town roads from November 1 to March 30. Removal shall be at owner's expense. It was also voted to prohibit plowing snow into town roads. There is a \$25 fine for this. Please do the right thing! –*Madeline Scully, Town Administrator*

Town Clerk Notes

Happy New Year, Windsor! I'm your Town Clerk, Sandy, and 2024 is going to be a busy year! We start off with our annual census and keep chugging along with four elections smattered throughout the year, as well as our Annual Town Meeting.

I believe strongly that if we want to live in a democracy we need to participate in that democracy. One way every person 18 and older can do that is by voting. If you haven't done so already, please register to vote. The deadline to register to vote in the Presidential Primaries is February 24, 2024.

With four elections, we need some volunteers. There is work to do both prior to each election and election day. If this sounds like something you would like to be part of, please contact me for more information or to sign up. Office hours are Monday and Thursday evenings, 5-7pm, by phone 413-684-3811 ext 1, or by email at windsortownclerk@gmail.com.

Another way to be involved in democracy is to take a turn sitting on a town committee. What are you good at doing? What interests you most? I bet we have a committee suited just for you! Please consider running in the May elections for one of the following open seats. (Contact the town clerk for more information and to obtain the nomination papers.)

Select Board: 3-year term, 1 vacancy

Moderator: 1 year term (Charles Sturtevant, incumbent) Cemetery Commission: 3-year term (Gary Boody, incumbent) Constable: 3-year term (Jordan Koch incumbent)

Finance Committee: 3-year term, 3 seats, 1 vacancy (Scott

Rogers and Holly Higinbotham, incumbents)

Library Trustee: 3-year term, 1 vacancy


Planning Board: 5-year term, 2 seats (Barb Connors and Peter Sternerup, incumbents)

Tree Warden: 1-year term (Mark Hauge, incumbent)

Census Forms: The Windsor Annual Census forms will be mailed in early January to each full-time residential household. This is a very important form, so please check it for accuracy, make any necessary changes, and send it back right away in the enclosed pre-addressed, stamped envelope. Your children must be on the form to go to school in district. This is also how the town gets funding to maintain our roads. The census does a lot for all of us. Please take 5 minutes, read the instructions, make corrections, and send it in. We do our best to make this as easy for you as possible.

Dog Licenses: Dog Licenses will be due at the end of April. The application form will be included with the census. We have moved to a 3-year license, so if you got one last year, you won't need another one until 2025. The cost is \$15 for a spayed/neutered dog and \$30 for an intact dog. If you're renewing your license, we have a copy of the rabies certificate on file. However, if you are registering your dog for the first time, please provide proof of rabies vaccination. Fill out the form completely, enclose payment, return in the envelope with your census form. We will mail your dog tags to you. If you require Kennel Dog Licenses, please contact me before April 1 to request the forms and I'll send it out. – Sandy Kalmus

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

<u>Help Wanted:</u> Kids' artwork to brighten the pages of our 2024-25 Windsor Phone Book & Community Director!



I've been inspired by the collage style of picture book artist Eric Carle. I made the picture at right using this technique. Want to try it yourself? Come to a workshop on Saturday, January 10 at

11AM at the Windsor library. Or, you can try it at home with the instructions below.

- **1.** Using acrylic paints, cover a whole piece of paper (8 $1/2" \times 11"$) with just one color. Paint additional sheets with other colors, so you have a sheet for every color you want to use.
- 2. While the paint is wet, make some jazzy patterns with a plastic fork or your fingers.
- 3. On a scrap sheet of paper, make a sketch of your picture. Use simple shapes because you have to cut out each shape.
- 4. Draw the picture shapes on the back of your painted papers.
 - 5. Cut out all the shapes and then place them on a plain sheet of white paper to make your picture.



When you have all the pieces in the places you like, glue them down.

Try making a picture of something you like to do in Windsor. Can you tell what I like to do from my picture above?
