From the Green Committee

As noted in last month's column, our latest grant application (\$38,580) has been approved by the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources (DOER). We just received notice that DOER signed the competitive grant contract so the Town has an effective date (11-9-2023) and can begin work on the two requested projects.

The Invitation for Bids and the contract language for the Town Highway Department's wall insulation (\$32,220) are drafted and will be posted in the statewide system. Since the Town Hall basement room insulation is projected to cost less than \$10,000 (\$6,360), those requests for bids can be advertised more locally.

All the work will require preparations: A sump pump will be installed in the perpetually damp Town Hall basement prior to insulating. The disruption to operations of the tools, trucks, and machinery in the garage will need coordination by the Highway Department. But in the end, the cold cave they've had will be snug and energy efficient. —Marnie Meyers

December Bird Tip

The abundance of cones in White Pine trees suggests that we may see a lot of Red Crossbills and White-winged Crossbills this winter.

This prediction comes from the annual Winter Finch Forecast (https://finchnetwork.org/winter-finch-forecast-2023-2024), which is published every year to indicate what species might be expected to "irrupt" into a more southerly area. It looks like a "moderate" year for some other winter finches, including Evening and Pine Grosbeaks, Pine Siskins, Common and Hoary Redpolls. Keep an eye on your feeders for these winter birds. —Holly Higinbotham

Historical Commission Updates

We hope you've noticed our continued work to put a fresh face on the exterior of the Historical House Museum on Route 9. We also made a good start at repairing the clapboards on the back of the house. We'll continue work in the spring and are making plans to have the museum open more regularly next summer.

We realize that the improved appearance of our building is not reflected in the sign out front. Our facelift needs to start at street level! So, with the amazing design work from recent member Kristina Almquist, a new sign is in the works, with plans for its installation in the next few weeks.

Transfer Station New Sticker Procedure

Due to the growing expense of providing the green Windsor plastic bags, those bags are being phased out and a new sticker system introduced. The transfer station management team is instituting this procedure to avoid sharp increases in the fees for trash disposal.

Here's how the sticker system works. Stickers are available for purchase at Friendly Fred's and Sangar's, at a cost of 5 stickers for \$5.

One sticker covers the amount of trash contained in:

One 33-gallon trash bag

OR Two 50 lb feed bags


OR Three Pellet bags (I have about 3 years of pellet bags if anyone needs some.)

A small kitchen trash bag will need ½ a sticker.


Please monitor your own use. Larry will be spotchecking, but we're relying on the honor system and all of you to make it work (and avoid increased costs).

You can continue to use the green Windsor bags (no sticker needed) until the supply is gone. Some are still available in the stores. –*Madeline Scully*

Editor's note: It occurs to me that this offers an opportunity to minimize the amount of plastic we're putting in the landfill by filling a 32-gallon garbage can (without a bag), bringing it to the transfer station, and emptying along with 1 sticker, then taking the can home to spray out and refill. I'm going to try it!

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Button Bonanza!

A recent post from Warren Meyer on the Windsor Facebook page featured a button from the Windsor Rod & Gun Club in 1983 that he had found during a house renovation. That jogged my memory – I had seen a number of those buttons in the Historical House and Museum, each one different and each marked with the year it was distributed.

I had to do a bit of hunting (the kind without guns...) but I turned up a whole display of buttons, with a metal plaque honoring one of the club founders, Ralph Kendall. It reads "Buttons donated by Bob Malone in memory of Ralph "B'dink" Kendall, founder of the Windsor Road & Gun Club with Bob Roraback in the 1960's."



Kendall, who died in 1996, served on our selectboard for a time and was a veteran of World War II.

As late as the year 2000, reports of Windsor Rod & Gun Club doings such as turkey shoots, barbeques and venison dinners at the club pavilion in the woods just west of Friendly Fred's would appear in the "Scatter Shots" section of Ted Giddings' long running



"Our Berkshires" column in the Berkshire Eagle.

The oldest button in our collection is from 1968, and the most recent is dated 2005.

The historical commission would love to know more about this club, which seems to have thrived for decades. (Any insight into the nickname B'dink would also be welcome!)
