
Town Census forms are being mailed to all full-time Windsor resident households in January. There will be a stamped return envelope. Read your form for accuracy, make changes, sign it and immediately return it, please.

Over the past few wet weeks, off road vehicles have damaged our environmentally sensitive nonmaintained roads. In coordination with the Conservation Commission and abutters, the Select Board has voted to close these roads to all vehicular traffic except for snowmobiles.

Unfortunately, winter rolled in making it impossible to install gates, but there will be signage and temporary barricades on these roads: Savoy Hollow from the intersection of Bates (past the Briggs property to the Savoy Line); Bates Road from the intersection of Savoy Hollow to Shaw Road; Nobody's Road from Peru Road to Crane Road. –Madeline Scully

The comment period for the town's municipal aggregation proposal has passed without any comment, which means that it will now move onto the next stage at the state Department of Public Utilities. It is anticipated that it will take at least a year for the DPU to review our proposal and, hopefully, grant permission for the town to enter into a contract, combined with other communities, to buy electricity as a group. Once the DPU grants permission for the town to proceed, you'll be hearing a lot more from us about the options available and how it will benefit households.

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# Winding up 250 Years of Being a Town

Is it a reunion if you've never met in real life? The question popped into my head a few weeks ago, when an unfamiliar car drove up our driveway and two gentlemen emerged.

"Susan? It's Ron. Ron Bilodeau," said the older of the two, smiling. "And this is my son, the other Ron Bilodeau."

Ron the elder spent much of his childhood here in Windsor. The quirky stone garage at the top of the hill – aside from the Congregational Church, probably the town's most recognizable architectural landmark – was built by Ron, his siblings, and their father Wilfred (Bill) Bilodeau.

He'd dropped by to bring me an old movie projector that I'd expressed an interest in along with some reels of Bilodeau home movies to go with it, donations to the Windsor Historical Commissions eclectic collection of art, artifacts, and reminders of the town's past.

Ron doesn't live here anymore – but Windsor lives in him. During this past year, while the pandemic often kept our community apart, the various events planned by community volunteers to commemorate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Windsor's incorporation managed to strengthen connections and create new ones. Ron, for example, wasn't able to come to any of the events – but his letters and emails about his childhood and his energetic and entrepreneurial dad (a pioneer in cable television) helped bring a particular Windsor era into focus as the historical commission worked on articles and events for the year.

A lot of people worked hard on a calendar included the July 3 250<sup>th</sup> kick-off event at Windsor Town Park, the fireworks and car show on August 28th, Windsor Historical Commission's special open day at the museum on September 12, the Giant Fall Festival at Sangar's on October 3, Jack Sobon's remarkable tour of the remnants of Windsor's old-growth forests on October 17<sup>th</sup>...What am I forgetting? We all struggled with the difficulties of planning amid changing rules for keeping people healthy amid COVID, but benefited from Windsor's wealth of beautiful outdoor spaces to gather safely.
