AND HERE'S A REPORT ON THE RESULTS OF OUR 2018 EFFORTS...

A variety of native plants were added to two locations: a white birch and azaleas in the Town Park, and a new garden around the War Memorial at the Town Hall, where a number of native bees, bumble bees, and butterflies, including Monarchs, were seen visiting the flowers. Also, a section along Route 8A was left unmown as a trial to provide more habitat and resources for pollinators while simultaneously reducing the work load and cost to the town. In early August, an assessment of the trial area revealed that numerous species of pollinators were visiting and feeding, including many bee species and flies, and a host of butterflies. We're helping our pollinators while beautifying our roadsides, all without sacrificing road safety or visibility. We hope we can keep these efforts going, and expand on them.
