From the Finance Committee

The Finance Committee is compiling the FY21 town budget and updating the five-year (FY21-FY25) budget framework. A key objective (unchanged from last year) is to limit the growth in the tax levy to 3 percent while taking on two large expenditure streams: \$112,000 a year for the Wahconah school project; and an average of \$175,500 a year for broadband debt service. Doing this will require a conservative approach to other spending and drawing on our financial reserves until the broadband Municipal Light Plant (MLP) begins repaying the budget.

The Finance Committee will soon be requesting department heads for their input into the FY21 budget process. Your help this year is particularly important to achieving the objectives described above. As a rule, departments that seem unlikely to spend their FY20 budget allocation will see their FY21 allocation level-funded. Otherwise, most departments will see their budgets increase by 2 percent unless department heads justify additional funding.



Green Committee Report

It's not too late to send your letter in support of S1974! Early February is the time when legislative committees decide what bills to send to the floor for votes. That means that the more the Joint Committee on Telecommunications, Utilities and Energy hears from Windsor residents (and your friends in other parts of the state) about the importance of S1974, the more likely that it will be "reported out" favorably by the committee and that it will get voted on by the whole legislature. As you remember, this is the piece of legislation that would change the designation of the town's solar array from "private" to "public," and that will allow us to be reimbursed at a higher rate for the electricity generated by the panels. In other words, a savings of about \$2,000 per year for the town! See the town website, www.windsormass.com, under BOARDS & DEPARTMENTS then GREEN COMMITTEE, for the sample letter and addresses.

In other news, we are in the midst of collecting and awarding bids for several projects funded by the \$62,800 grant from the state Department of Energy Resources. Those projects include adding insulation to both the town office building and town hall; installing air source heat pumps to provide heat and air conditioning for the basement area of the town offices; and further supporting energy conservation in the town offices with insulation curtains and an airtight door on the lower level.

Baked Potato Supper March 8 at Town Hall featuring great food and woman suffrage musical celebration

The Windsor Historical Commission is excited to put on our fourth annual Baked Potato Supper on Sunday, March 8, 5-7PM in the Windsor Town Hall. The menu will feature baked potatoes (white & sweet) with special toppings ranging from meat chili to vegan lentil stew, along with tossed salad and homemade dessert. The cost is \$10/person (\$5/child under 12); maximum \$30 per family. All proceeds help support the restoration of the Windsor Historical Museum (which will begin in the spring).

The evening's entertainment will feature a special program of music of the woman suffrage movement, presented by musician Deb Burns from Williamstown. Singing was a big part of the woman suffrage movement, as with most political movements – used to arouse emotion, build unity, and simply make noise. Working to win the vote for women, our grandparents and great grandparents sang with gusto in marches,

demonstrations, parades, and celebrations.

The songs were intentionally easy to learn, set to catchy popular tunes of the time but with new lyrics. Those lyrics offer fascinating insights into the political strategy of the suffrage movement. We'll learn some songs and take a look at the messages the suffragists carried in the stubborn fight to win the ballot.

Memories of "Our Country Club"

Former kids: Swimming to "the rock" as a rite of passage. Waiting for the ice-cream truck. Running barefoot across the hot asphalt parking lot. Wading out with a fish net to see what lurked below the surface. Water temperature: just fine.

Their parents: Long summer afternoons sitting on the grass catching up with other parents. Letting the kids run free in a place small enough to be safe, but large enough to be fun. Water temperature: freezing.

With news of the planned re-opening of Windsor State Forest, aka Windsor Jambs, I wanted to hear from people who spent time at this famed mountain-brook swimming hole "back in the day", before it

closed in 2009. Thanks to everyone who helped me gather these memories, and here's to Windsor Jambs' next chapter.



"It was our country club," Sue Riley told me. "In the summers, it's where our playgroup would meet." She remembers the freezing water, the annual picnic of the Windsor Volunteer Fire Department, and the little sandy beach.

"In the summer, every morning, the kids and I would

do all of our chores, and they knew that once they were finished, we would be going to Windsor Jambs for the afternoon," said Cynthia Glendon. "It was a lovely spot."



"I certainly remember being intimidated by the thought of swimming out to 'the rock' on the far side, and the sense of accomplishment after having done that the first few time," Ethan Kohn wrote via email.

"The rock" looms large in other memories: "Windsor Jambs was a wonderful place to bring our kids to enjoy the sun and play in the cold water and to accept the challenge to swim out the rock," wrote Dee and Bob Farrell. "The boys had a wonderful time playing with friends and it was a very safe space. I remember one of the highlights was when they finally swam to the other side and sat on the big rock. The cold never seemed to bother any of them," wrote Deb Drumm. "I'm so delighted that my son's children will now get to experience this beautiful place."
