### **Green Committee Report**

Good news! There are two pieces of legislation making progress in the state Legislature, both of which would allow Windsor to be reimbursed at a higher rate for the electricity generated by the solar panel array at the town offices.

S1974, which we wrote about here last month, was reported favorably out of the Joint Committee on Telecommunications, Utilities, and Energy. Also, the Senate passed a large piece of legislation, S2477, which includes Amendment 64 that would do the same thing as S1974. Thanks to our senator, Adam Hinds, for proposing that amendment and getting it accepted!

The next step for both pieces of legislation is to get passed by the full Legislature and signed by the governor. If andwhen that happens, our town solar array will be designated as "public" instead of "private," which means the town will be credited for the full value of the electricity we generate. This is in addition to the annual income of approximately \$8,000 for solar renewable energy certificates (SRECs) which Windsor has been receiving. Thanks to all who wrote or called members of the TUE to advocate for this legislation. Your voice matters!

### Friday Night Café March Line-Up



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## News Hound, Photographer, Tree Farmer

A few weeks ago, Martin Glendon of Driscoll Road reached out to the Windsor Historical Commission with a gift: carefully preserved negatives of photographs taken by his father – also Martin F. Glendon – during his years as a reporter for the Berkshire Eagle from about 1952 until his death in 1966.

During those years, Glendon moved his family from Dalton to the old farmstead he bought, where Martin the younger still lives with his wife Cindy. He started a tree-farming business, while continuing to roam the hill towns with his camera and notepad. "He loved that job," his son remembers. "He worked with a really erudite group of people, smart and creative...He got to meet everybody. Politicians, local characters, farmers, mechanics."



When the Dalton Fire Department donated a 1940 Ford ambulance to the brand-new Windsor Volunteer Fire Department in 1958, Glendon was there with his trusty Graflex Speed Graphic camera. (Napoleon Iwanowicz, Windsor's Fire Chief at the time, on left).



When the state highway department rolled out an absolute Rube Goldberg beast of a snow blower on Route 9 that same year, he was there too. And he snapped John Doyle smiling behind the bar at the now-vanished Berkshire Trail Café (see inside, page 3).

As you can see from this photograph, taken in 1953, Glendon embodied the newsman persona right down to the hat. The Commission is grateful to benefit from



Glendon's love of this town and its characters and his foresight in carefully preserving his negatives. I hope to share more as I go through the process of digitizing and cataloguing them for the emerging Windsor Historical Commission archive. –*Susan Phillips*
