### **Town Clerk Notes**

Nomination papers have been returned for our local election May 10, 2020.

Incumbents are running for Select Board, Finance, Tree Warden, Moderator, Constable and Planning Board. There are no competitive races so far. No one has come forward to run for Library Trustee or Cemetery Commission. Nomination papers are not due until late March so there is still time. The election will once again be a drive through election at the Town Hall. More info to come.

The Annual Town Meeting, usually scheduled for May 3, will be May 10 at the Town Park. This will be a drive-in with infield sound added. Some voting procedures from last year will change. More info to come.

Sadly, Windsor lost one of our own in February. Isolation may have played a part. In response to this tragedy, the COA is calling all residents 65 and over to just check in. Let them know if you are in need or maybe just need a phone call every once in a while. Also let them know if you have time to volunteer or would like to give time to the town.

### From the Green Committee

A few months ago, we wrote about the fact that rebates are available for certain energy-saving improvements in your home. Here is information from the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission about the MassSave program and other opportunities: Sign up for a no cost, no obligation home energy assessment either online, by virtual video chat or in home visits. Online assessment is available at <a href="https://www.masssave.org/OHEA">www.masssave.org/OHEA</a>, or call Mass Save 866-527-SAVE to schedule a Virtual or in-person assessment. This program offers the opportunity to:

- Receive up to \$2,750 in equipment and appliance rebates for major improvements such as central air conditioning, heat pumps or high efficiency boilers, lighting and appliances.
- Receive up to 100% off approved insulation and weatherization
- Get 0% financing for insulation, heating and cooking systems, water heaters and more
- Receive free products such as LED lightbulbs, smart power strips, smart thermostats, showerhead and faucet aerators
- You can even receive a cash payment for recycling your old (but functional) refrigerator or freezer \$75 and they'll pick up!

### Important: Set Up Your Broadband Payment Account Online

If you have been hooked up for gigabit broadband service, you need to be watching for an e-mail invoice for your first month's service. The email was sent to the address you provided when you signed up and has instructions on how to get to the payment portal and set up your electronic payment.

There are no US mail paper invoices and only electronic payments are accepted. You can use a credit card, but we would prefer that you set up an electronic funds transfer from a bank account as that saves the town the cost of credit card processing fees.

If you missed the email you should call customer service at 413-485-1251 and get the information required for you to set up your payments. If you have had service for 30 days you will have received the email so if you missed it, please call and correct the situation. —Doug McNally

A number of years ago, at The Creamery in Cummington, there was a nearly human-sized piece of white paper tacked on the bulletin board with the handwritten heading, "Local Wildlife Sightings" and a pen on a string tacked nearby. It was so simple: people wrote the date, whatever was spotted and where.

I loved reading and watching that list grow. It painted a gradual picture of a place and said as much about the people doing the reporting as the things being reported. Some wrote lengthy descriptions. Others, just the facts. The handwriting offered clues: that the writer was a child or an elder, was in a rush, had grease on their hands, ran out of ink. It was messy. There were lots of exclamation points, or joy. Some anger and sadness, too. And definitely humor: one time the "wildlife" had two-legs and was driving too fast.

Lately I've been thinking a lot about this list. How spontaneous it was. Not like scrolling for the perfect meme or emoji or clicking Like or Share. In fact, the exact opposite. It was a slowed-down and original form of sharing



and connecting. Joy, sadness, anger, humor all had more than one face.

Please don't get me wrong: social media has its place. But, after a year of social isolation, I realize more than ever the value of true connection and just thought it would be nice to share this with you. Maybe, once we can all use the same pen without having to wipe it down, we could do

something similar at Sangar's and Fred's. I'd love to know what you think. --- Patty Crane
