As I'm writing this, vote by mail is underway, with many residents choosing this convenient method. It's a lot of work but greatly satisfying. In a couple of days Early Voting begins and I am excited to see how that goes. By the time you are reading this, the Presidential Primaries on March 5, will most likely have taken place. If you haven't already, you can see the results on Windsormass.com.

Local Elections: Speaking of elections, the Annual Town Meeting and Local Elections are coming up in May. There are still several seats on various committees we need to fill. I encourage you to consider running for one of these positions. This is your town too. You live here. Your skills and opinions are valuable assets to Windsor. By taking a role on a committee, you can help share responsibility and shape our community, while strengthening your own connection to Windsor. Think about what you enjoy and how you could best contribute. Please reach out to me for more information and/or to obtain nomination papers which are due March 25th. Dog Licenses: In last month's edition, I said the dog licenses would be coming to you by the end of the month, but I wasn't able to make that happen. Working on the elections took more time than I expected. I certainly will do my best to get the licenses out by the end of March.

Green Commitee Report

Windsor earned the Green Community designation on December 22, 2015, after meeting five sustainability criteria. Since then, the town has installed the Town Office photovoltaic array (PV), upgraded municipal building insulation and lighting, and replaced aging heating and hot water systems with more energy-efficient units. All of this has been funded primarily by grants and state incentives. The combination of grants, rebates, and solar renewable energy certificates received totals \$372,550.

Quotes are coming in for additional grant-funded insulation projects expected to be completed this year. Funding for additional PV projects is available for towns that earn the Climate Leader Community designation, which is the next level after being appointed as a Green Community.

Six criteria must be met to apply for the Climate Leader Community designation. One of the criteria is adoption of the Specialized Energy Code, which requires a vote at a Town Meeting. This Code has been adopted by 20 Massachusetts municipalities, including Northampton. We are hoping to get an article on the warrant for the May Annual Town Meeting for Windsor to adopt the Code. We are in the early stages of planning an informational meeting for a date in April to provide details about the effect of implementing this new building code. *--Stu Besnoff*

Open Positions on the Ballot for May Town Election

The following seats will appear on the ballot for our local election in May. ("Vacancy" means no one is currently running for the position. "Incumbent" means the person who just held the position is running again. You would be running against them in the election. It is okay if you want to run, too. That is what democracy is all about.)

Select Board: 3-year term, 1 Vacancy

Library Trustee: 3-year term, 1 Vacancy

Finance Committee: 3-year term, 3 seats, 1 Vacancy; 2 incumbents (Scott Rogers and Holly Higinbotham)

Tree Warden: 1-year term, 1 Vacancy

Moderator: 1-year term; 1 incumbent (Charles Sturtevant)

Cemetery Commission: 3-year term; l incumbent (Gary Boody)

Constable: 3-year term; 1 incumbent (Jordan Koch)

Planning Board: 5-year term, 2 seats; 2 incumbents (Peter Sternerup and Barb Connors)

There is also an open seat for an appointment (not elected) on the Board of Health. This is a 3-year position and training will be provided. Meetings are monthly and as needed. ENERGY SAVING TIP

Wash your clothes in cold water. Washing in cold water can reduce your energy use by 90%, on average, when switching from hot to cold water. Switching one load from hot to cold saves enough electricity to power the average American home for over an hour,

based on average American household electricity consumption, as reported by the U.S. Energy Information Administration. In addition to financial and environmental benefits:

- Cold water is better at removing some types of stains. Hot water can set stains; plus shrink, fade, and wrinkle certain fabrics.
- Delicate fabrics (lace and silk) and dark, colorful fabrics actually do best in coldwater.
- Cold water can reduce wrinkles, shrinking, and fading.

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The More Things Change...

(an excerpt from the **November 1984** issue of Windsor Now & Then)

For those of you who may have passed by the East Windsor Chapel, either at the fall service or some other time, you may have noticed that the south roof has been reroofed. This job was completed this summer by Bill Daignault and his crew. Many people have contributed to the cost of fixing the roof, but we are especially indebted to Bernice Mongue Filkins of Dalton, who contributed \$500.00. Bernice grew up in East Windsor, living in what is now the Sawtelle house, along with her parents Peter and Evelyn Mongue. This building was sometimes known as the Village Inn and was the last store in East Windsor.

The Historical House in the center of town recently got a coat of paint on the west side, thanks to commission members Ralph Peck and Melody Burdick, assisted by Dick Burdick and Bill Biggart. Our thanks go to the Leslie Bird and Hugh Ferry families for loaning ladders.

Above I mentioned donations which helped fix the Chapel roof. We depend on donations for most of our income. Our next scheduled (expensive) project is fixing the crumbling west foundation in the Chapel. This may take over \$1000.

It is only fitting to mention that we have received \$230 in contributions in the memory of Joe Mattis, a former commission member and General Chairman of the Windsor Bicentennial, which is credited for interesting many people in the history of Windsor and ultimately getting the Commission established. As Joe lived in East Windsor as a boy, I am sure he would have like to see the Chapel restored and maintained. – Jim Kierstead

As we mark the milestone of 40 years of Windsor Now & Then, it's good to consider what has changed, and what remains the same. This item by the late Jim Kierstead, long-time WHC member and Town Meeting Moderator, is from November of 1984. Windsor volunteers are still borrowing ladders and painting clapboards, but the Sawtelle house is gone and the future of the East Windsor Chapel is uncertain. *--Susan Phillips*
