**Construction of the culvert on River Road** near the Savoy line began this week. River Road is closed to through traffic at that point. The recommended detour between Route 9 and 116 is to use 8A, but Windigo road to Windsor Bush Road, or West Street in Plainfield also provide a bypass. If all goes well the closing will end prior to winter weather.

## From the Green Committee

The Town has received another grant from the Department of Energy Resources (DOER) Green Communities Division for \$45,595 for three projects at the Town Hall. The grant will provide \$23,000 for weatherization and insulation, \$7,854 for thermal shades, and \$14,741 for Air Source Heat Pumps (ASHPs).

The effective date for the grant was September 7, 2021, so the Committee is busy preparing to solicit bids for the three projects. The combination of thermal shades and weatherization will mean more insulation for walls, floor and even windows in the Town Hall. Our goal has been to create a full envelope around the building. However, an inaccessible part of the basement (under the stage and part of the main floor) prevents a full envelope. But there will be many fewer drafts and cold spots once the insulating is complete. (The last DOER grant allowed us to insulate the attic and ceiling.) ASHPs provide more energy-efficient heating than traditional oil and propane gas boilers and furnaces and will allow for air-conditioning that the whole community can use in a weather emergency. --*Holly Higinbotham, higinbo@hotmail.com, 413-212-435*

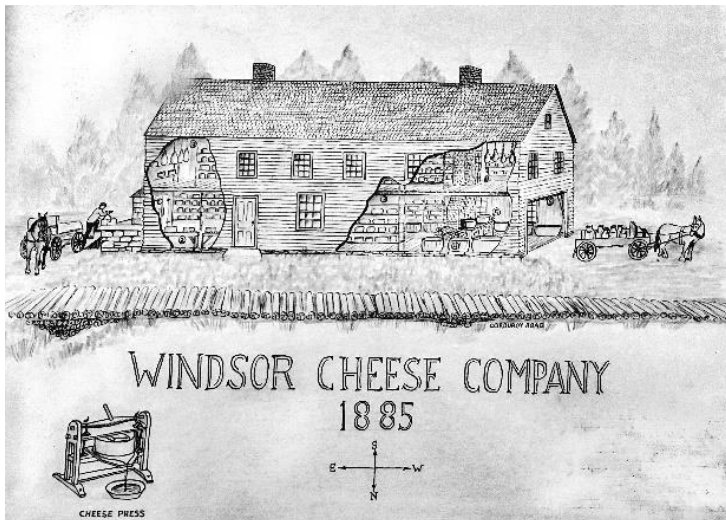
## Park Run is a Winner!

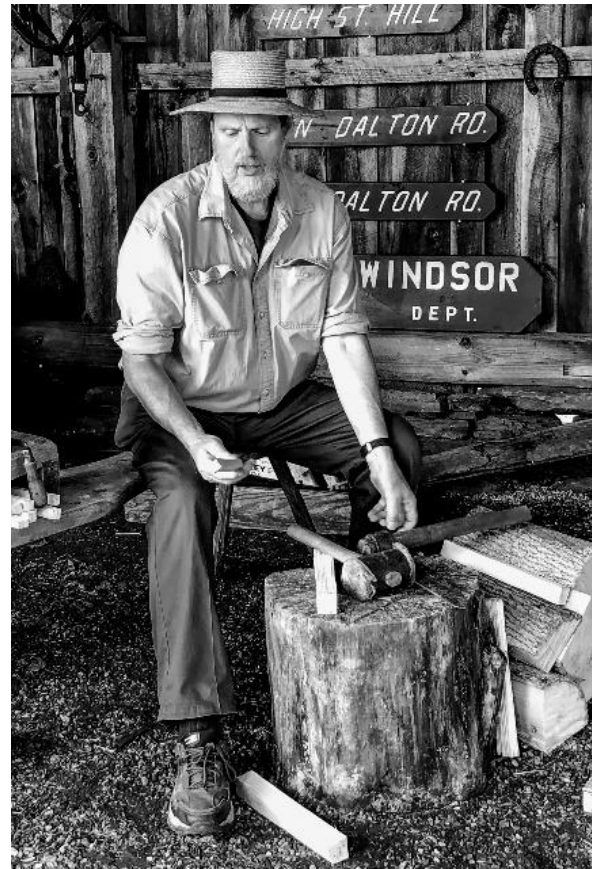
## History Day Celebration a Success!

After a long pandemic shutdown, it was a joy to welcome visitors to the Windsor Historical House on September 12. With a new coat of barn-red paint on two sides of the house, and a thorough decluttering of our beautiful timber-frame carriage shed – a monument to Windsor’s volunteer spirit if there ever was one – it was a perfect day to celebrate our community, past and present.

Visitors could step inside the main room for a fresh look at Olive Volsky’s dioramas depicting long-ago Windsor, as well as her drawings of vanished landmarks like the Windsor Cheese Factory. Or they could duck into the tepee on the front lawn, where Jennifer Lee led the way in a consideration of the life of the Mahican community here before and after the arrival of colonists in 1771.



Over in the shed, master timber framer Jack Sobon demonstrated a few of the skills used by the volunteer crew he led in building the shed back in 1997. The stubbornly un-buried time capsule from our bicentennial in 1971 was on display as well, along with tools both mysterious and familiar from the Historical Commission collection.

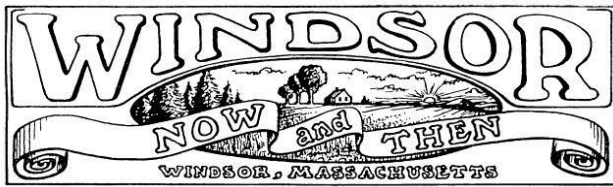


Jack Sobon demonstrating peg-making for timber framing.

#### Ohketeau Cultural Center

(<https://www.ohketeau.org/>) *Ohketeau* is the Nipmuc word for a place to plant and grow. Located in Ashfield.

**Bonnie Hartley** and **Nathan Allison** are Mohican Representatives in Williamstown and Massachusetts tribal historical preservation officers.
