What Windsorites are Reading

Australian-American journalist and novelist Geraldine Brooks had me at the title: *Horse*. This historical fiction book weaves together three compelling stories: the lifelong bond between an enslaved boy and a remarkable thoroughbred colt he encourages and protects from birth; an oil painting of a racehorse that is rescued from sidewalk trash in Georgetown by a PhD student in art history; and a dusty skeleton, labeled simply as "horse," stored in the attic of the Smithsonian.

The book opens in 1850 and follows Jarret and Lexington through two decades of rewards and challenges at a time when both were considered mere chattel to be exploited by one racehorse owner to the next. The stories of the painting and skeleton that are "discovered" a century and a half later shine light on racial injustice that still lives with us.

Brooks is a gripping storyteller, and the reader can't help but care deeply and hope for a good outcome. In fact, Lexington (1850-75) is one of the greatest racehorses of his day and sire to more winning horses than any other American thoroughbred to date. His bones are at the Smithsonian. The book, published in June 2022, is 401 pages. –Leslie Reed

From the Green Committee

The Green Committee recently completed its "eight-year summary," which is a review of all of the energy conservation projects undertaken since the committee was formed in 2015. These projects include the installation of the photovoltaic array at the town offices, which technically is not energy conservation, but because it reduces our energy costs and captures energy from renewable resources, we are including it in our review.

A total of \$352,770 has been spent on these projects, of which only \$27,343 was drawn from town funds. All of the other funding has come from grants, federal funds, and rebates.

In addition, there has been some revenue generated by these projects, which funnels directly into the town's general fund for operating expenses. The PV array generates Solar Renewable Energy Certificates (known as SREC's), and since FY2019, \$20,585 has been added to the town coffers. Two other one-time payments, a rebate for \$7,852 and a stipend for \$1,000, have also been paid into the general fund.

When FY22 is compared to our baseline year of FY15, there was a 32% reduction in both usage and cost. The combined annual savings for the past three years (FY20, FY21, and FY22), compared to FY15, was \$73,817. That is an annual average savings of \$24,606.


This report does not include the upcoming project this fall to replace the roof of the highway garage with new metal roof panels. The interior of the roof will have R-38 spray foam insulation. That \$126,000 project overseen by the Select Board will be paid entirely out of federal funds (American Rescue Plan Act, or ARPA), and should result in lower heating costs for that building.
